



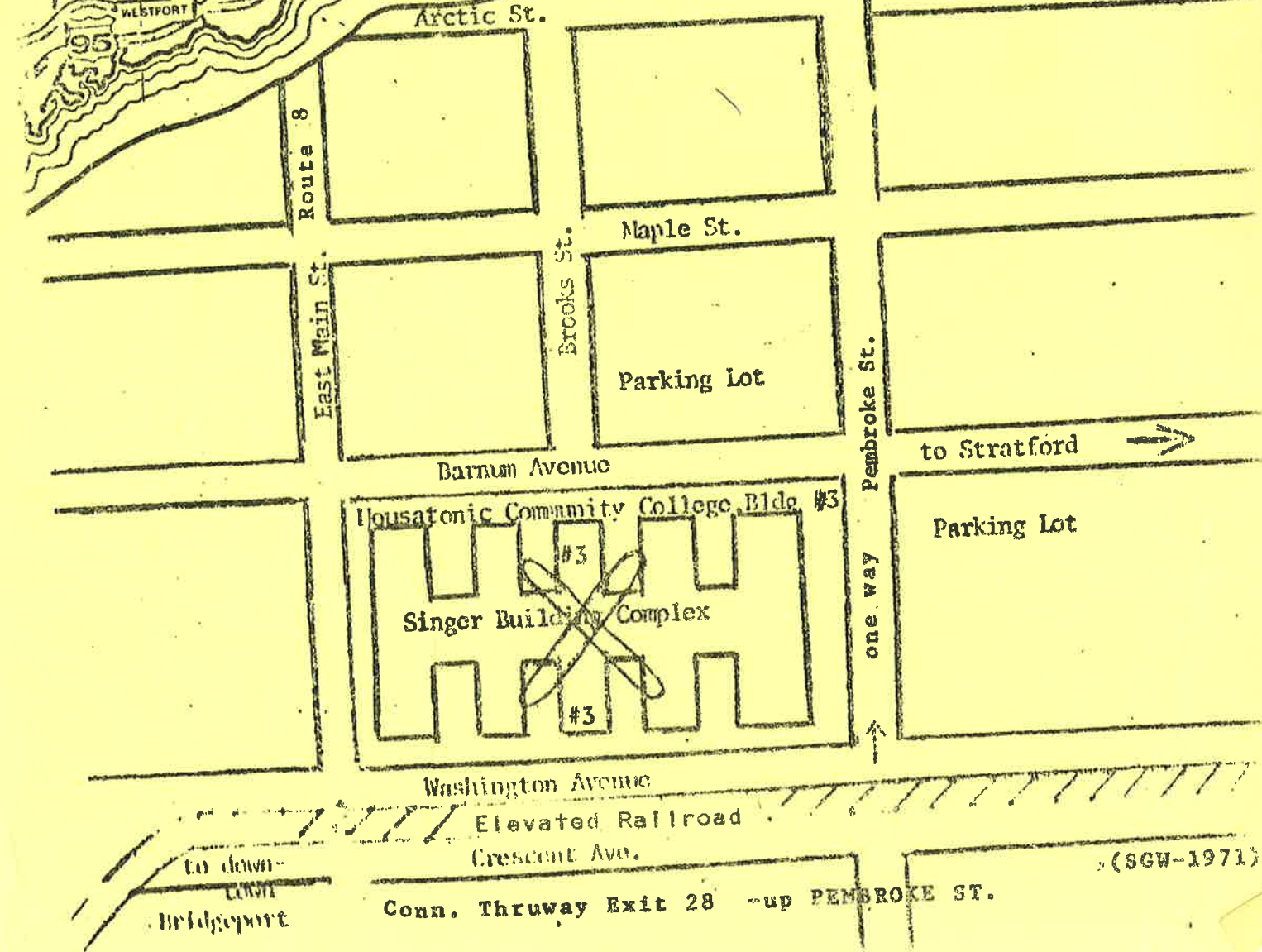

MINUTES

On Friday, April 27, 1973, at 8:00 P.M. our first annual-business meeting commenced. Our President, Tom Newton, brought us up to date on the following items:

1. Saul Dursht, formerly a charter member, is now an Emeritus member.
2. Our statement to the Board of Trustees which came out of our 1972 October meeting was recognized in that a reply was sent to the state technical colleges [The regional community colleges received no response.]
3. It was recalled that we, MATYCONN, became officially incorporated at the 1972 October meeting.
4. Jean Smith made a motion that the MATYCONN Executive Board be entrusted, in the interim between meetings, to issue to the proper authority statements which they would judge to be advantageous to all mathematics teachers. (The motion was seconded by John Pazdar and the vote unanimously in favor.)
5. The MATYC Journal has ten organizations sponsoring it. The New York State group of math teachers and some other groups have expressed interest in holding a National Annual Meeting (the place and time to be at Grossinger's in New York on the third day of April 1974.) The schedule for the event is tentative but might be seen to include two and one half days of social meets, a dinner, state meetings, and four sessions devoted to a theme of "National Cooperation and Communication". A response would be necessary by October 1973.

MATYCONN discussed the matter; concern was expressed over the time of the meeting relative to our own annual meeting, and over the number of persons who would like to, or be able to, attend. The idea of sending a representative was brought forth. We concluded that the decision for attendance at the National Meeting be left as an individual matter, for the present. ... It was intended that Anita Tracy, our REGIONAL EDITOR, would get more information on this topic at the April 28, 1973 New York meeting which she was attending.

6. Another consequence of this discussion was Peter Wursthorn's motion to:
 - A. let our October meeting [the date of which would be decided by the Executive Board] be our organizational meeting which would begin our year together and serve as incentive to send out forms and gather information to be shared;
 - B. have, possibly, a workshop meeting during the January following that October;
 - C. have our annual-meeting at the end of April, during which there would be
 1. a change of officers
 2. a dinner
 3. reports on the state meetings as gotten at the National Meeting that same month.
7. It was announced that the members of the nominating committee are; Inez Everest
Ethel Dursht
Dorothy Reiss
Jean Smith, CHRMN.
8. We had a new member attend our annual meeting -- WELCOME, Susan Strahn from Mitchell College.

The meeting was adjourned at approximately 9:00 P.M. and a social hour followed. On Saturday, we had a delicious dinner with an attendance of over 25, and a guest speaker. All workshops that day were successful and very informative. There are reports on them included with these minutes.
